



## **Troubled waters**

#### Two offshore workers say they want change

Despite progress in the offshore industry after the BP oil spill last year, two offshore employees have shed new light from their experience on the waters about what has been occurring in their perspectives and changes they would like to see happen.

Chad Noel and Terry Davis, both of Leonville, said it is time for every working man on a rig to unify as a group and say "this is what we want, and this is what we demand."

"We are not a union, but we can become unified. If we all stand together, we're going to get what we need, not want exactly, but what we need," said Noel.

Although he said he has been working in the industry for more than 20 years, Davis said it could be better than what it is.

Noel, an offshore employee working for nearly 15 years in the industry, said, "The oilfield business is designed like any other job; they are designed to protect themselves."

"Everything is basically about them, but they speak like they care about the hands out there," said Noel. "That's the way they move, everything they do is to protect themselves legally. They say it's for us, but it's to protect themselves as a company."

According to Davis, he works 14 days with 14 days off monthly. "If I go to work and I'm sick, they are going to send me home without pay," he said. "I'm thankful I still have a job, and I'm still working. That's not the point though, I can get sick. "What about me then?"

"I've been stressing having at least seven days of paid sick leave for years," added Noel. "I cannot work if I'm sick. It's not that I don't want to, I'm not physically able to."

"What about the 11 guys that got killed? Everybody is just looking at I want to collect. Give me this. Give me that. You know that's wrong," said Davis. "I'm not here for me, I'm out here to make a paycheck for my family." Davis also said he does not want to see anyone on his rig hurt or killed while working. "If I see somebody get killed, that's a done deal. That's a wrap. I've been out here too long, and I've never seen it," he said. "I hope I never see it, or I'm gone."

"My personal opinion from my experience is it was shortcuts that led to the BP oil

As her parents struggle she's without a care.


The slave, disrespected, segregated girls are ashamed.

spill incident. Nobody should have died out there," commented Noel, "and the moratorium that followed did hurt me personally." "Work had gotten a little slow, but I am now working regularly."

Although Noel claimed the moratorium affected him, he said he felt it was necessary. "There was some good that came out of it because something had to be done. We have to stop taking shortcuts," he said. "People say we make good money, but we work in a dangerous environment."

"I think there's been a lot of changes in the industry since the BP incident and the moratorium. It got a lot more strict," said Noel, "but we still have a lot of slackers in a lot of areas that are still taking shortcuts."

Noel also hinted people in the offshore industry are still not taking safety seriously. "I think they need to get strict on our superiors out there-all of them out there that are taking shortcuts, and their main office has no idea about what is going on," he said.

"There's been a lot of hiding going on. I think they need to make more current visits, have stronger stipulations on paperwork and stay on the rig for a certain amount of time to watch and evaluate what is going on," said Noel.

"There's been a lot of cutbacks in the company," added Noel, "and they are cutting back on bonuses and raises." "We're not getting recognized for a lot of things we used to get recognized for in order for them to save money."

"We have bonuses, paid vacation and holidays, but people in the company offices are making the money and getting raises. Hey, let us get some recognition," he exclaimed, "and let us get some money, too!"

"A pat on the back is a pat on the back. Pay us more money because everything else is going up," said Davis. Davis and Noel also expressed concern about travel on highways at night and early morning. "When we travel all night on the highway to our destination, some of us have to go straight to work," said Noel. "You're fatigued. You are not focused, but they expect you to remain focused."

"I got to leave like at one in the morning. Sometimes, I just drive 12 hours," added Davis.

"Some of us have worked all night when it's time to go home and hit a long drive home. All of that going and coming back needs to be put in perspective and stipulated with companies that we get proper rest prior to going to work and proper rest prior to coming home," said Noel.

"The companies don't see it like we see it. I just feel like they are not respecting us out here, said Davis. They come to the rig to check this out and look at that, but they are not coming to us and talking to us."
