



When I was diagnosed with Breast cancer a few years back, I reacted like most who receive a cancer diagnose; first thing came to mind was a "death sentence". However, I found out later that it was truly "an awakening" for me; even after being diagnosed with colon cancer a few years later. I began questioning God, why would you do this to me? What had I done in life so bad to have this placed upon me? But instead of bemoaning my fate, I decided to look for the positive side of it. There has to be a reason for it all.

I also realized that I was about to face a new beginning, new hope, do and see more with a whole new prospective on life. When I think of the "gift of life" that was given to me, I know that I will develop and gain strength from all my experiences. Even with the complications I now have to live with, and all the struggles I've dealt with my entire life, I still feel truly blessed. For a while, I wasn't happy with the way I looked after my surgery and the pain I had to endure each day, but I decided to snap out of it. I thought about the individuals that are no longer among us. I also realized that there will always be someone worse off than I am. I reminded myself, that I "still have my life" and who am I to complain.

One day I experienced something of a miracle and felt the compulsion to write it down. I turn that experience into a poem and I called it "Peace". I took that poem, along with many others I had composed during my breast cancer period and placed them into book form. Writing had became therapy for me. I was blessed enough to have that book published and it's titled "True Simple Poems of Life, Faith and Survival". I'm hoping that anyone who has the opportunity to read my poems get out of them, what I placed in all of them. My poems are from the heart, as real as any could ever be. With the words and phrases of each poem of statement, I wish to make a positive impact on someone who's ill or otherwise, where they could develop the strength to embrace life in a whole new way. I never anticipated becoming a writer, I just became one. I truly believe when you survive a horrific tragedy or a horrible disease as cancer, it's for a reason, "you have a purpose" and I want to live to find find out exactly what that is for me. The experiences I've had to endure and the strength I developed from it all, are what gave me insight to form the words of my poems.

I recently had another inspirational children book published and it's titled, "If Only I Could Fly said Mattie-bee" and I'm working on my third. See, that's what I'm all about now, inspiration. I would have never become a writer, producing inspirational stories, if I had not gone through all that I did. I'm a true example that you can survive cancer not once, but twice, providing you catch it in time, have faith and allow that faith to direct your path. I've not saying all will be easy, but you must believe. This is what my experiences with cancer made of me, a true believer! (F&S)

Landrieu Holds Roundtable to Examine Ways to Address Racial Wealth Gap

Senator releases report examining causes of the wealth gap.

WASHINGTON – United States Senator Mary L. Landrieu, D-La., Chair of the Senate Committee on Small Business and Entrepreneurship, held a roundtable Wednesday focused on finding solutions and best practices for closing the racial wealth gap. Sen. Landrieu also released a committee report that takes a snapshot of what the current wealth gap looks like and what may be contributing to it.

Between 1983 and 2011, the median net worth among white families rose 36 percent. Over that same time, the median net worth among African-American families rose only 5 percent, while the median net worth among Hispanic families actually dropped by 7 percent.

Sen. Landrieu was joined at the roundtable by Reps. Cedric Richmond, D-La., and Sheila Jackson-Lee, D-Texas.

"Fifty years ago, America engaged in a war on poverty that was aimed, in large part, at closing the economic gap between whites and minorities," Sen. Landrieu said. "Since that time, we have made great strides in a number of areas. The gaps between whites and minorities in income and education have closed. This is good news, and we should be proud of this achievement. Yet, data tells us that this progress has not translated into the closing of the wealth gap.

"Closing that wealth gap is a challenge we must meet for America to compete effectively in the 21st century global economy. We need all, not two-thirds, of our workers, entrepreneurs and businesses playing on the field and not standing on the sidelines."

The key question Sen. Landrieu and the participants focused on during the roundtable was "what are we doing wrong in regards to solving the wealth gap issue and why isn't the wealth gap decreasing like other areas, such as income and high school completion?" Cont. on page 14

The report released by the committee focused on several issues that contribute to the existence of the wealth gap, including:

Americans and Hispanics owned a home.

☐ Education: According to the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, a significant
amount of student debt can limit the ability to open a small business. The Department of
Education found that the median and average student debt levels vary by demographic. In 2007-
08, African-Americans took out the highest amount of student loan debt.
☐ Lending Inequalities: According to Dr. Robert Fairlie, Professor of Economics at the
University of California at Santa Cru, minorities face lender discrimination, which in turn
impacts their ability to open or expand a small firm as well as attain wealth. In fact, SBA's
Office of Advocacy found the fear of loan application rejection to be higher amongst minorities
than Caucasians. In 2010, 15.2 percent of Caucasians did not apply for a small business loan due
to fear, compared to 38.8 percent of African-Americans and Hispanics. This trend also existed

along gender lines, with 21.1 percent of women not applying compared to 17.8 percent of men.

Homeownership: For most American families, their most valuable asset is their home.

In 2004, 76 percent of Caucasians, 60 percent of Asians, and fewer than 50 percent of African-

Sen. Landrieu also sent a letter to 100 mayors throughout America to ask for their ideas and suggestions for best practices and solutions to meeting the challenge of closing the wealth gap. Sen. Landrieu will take the responses from the mayors, as well as input from those who participated in the roundtable and other key stakeholders and release a follow-up report next year. That report will detail the solutions, initiatives and programs needed to meet the challenge of closing the wealth gap.

Yesterday, Sen. Landrieu met with Marc Morial, President of the National Urban League and Rep. Gregory Meeks, D-N.Y., to discuss the wealth gap during her visit to the Congressional Black Caucus's (CBC) Annual Legislative Conference. Morial and Rep. Meeks hosted a panel discussion today at the CBC conference to discuss the racial wealth gap.

"My work on the wealth gap will not end with the report or the roundtable," Sen. Landrieu said. "My committee will continue working on this throughout the next year, so that we can figure out the best ways to provide more opportunities for American families to have the necessary tools to move upward economically into the mainstream and onto the playing field."

Hairston, Special Secretary of Minority Affairs in the Office of Minority Affairs for the Maryland Governor's Office Zenita Wickham Hurley, Esq., Vice President of Operations for U.S. Black Chambers, Inc. Toya Powell, President and CEO of the Association for Enterprise Opportunity Connie Evans, Executive Director of the National Coalition for Asian Pacific American Community Development Lisa Hasegawa, Forest County Potawatomi Community Tribal Member and Chairman of the Board of the Potawatomi Business Development Corporation Kevin Allis, Managing Partner of Delta Decisions of DC, LLC Dr. Shree Taylor, and President of RCI Technologies, Inc. National Children's Grief Awareness Day is observed every year on the Thursday before Thanksgiving. This time of year is a particularly appropriate time to support grieving children because the holiday season is often an especially difficult time after a death. Children's Grief Awareness Day seeks to bring attention to the fact that often support can make all the difference in the life of a grieving child. This year Children's Grief Awareness Day will be observed on Thursday, November 21, 2013. This day provides us the opportunity to recognize and support the millions of grieving children across the nation- the thousands of grieving children in our own communities- and the grieving children we know and see in our daily lives.

Before they graduate from high school, one child out of every 20 will have a parent die-and that number doesn't include those who experience the death of a brother or sister, a close grandparent, aunt or uncle, or a friend. They certainly look "normal"...and yet there's still that hole inside.


